LOUISIANA AGRICULTURE & FORESTRY TODAY FDA confirms Clostridium Botulinum type C in alfalfa hay cubes tied to death of multiple LA horses

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture & Forestry (LDAF), in cooperation with the U.S. Food and do, with many other hors-Drug Administration (FDA) and the California Animal Health & Food Safety Laboratory (CAHFS), has confirmed the presence of Clostridium botulinum type *C* in alfalfa hay cubes linked to the death of at least 20 horses in Louisiana. This incident, which has evolved into a multi-state epizootic of Equine Botulism linked to the same alfalfa hay cubes, has also been con-

nected to at least 28 similar horse deaths in New Mexico, Texas, and Coloraes becoming clinically ill. Equine Botulism is a condition caused from a bacterial toxin produced by *Clostridium botulinum*. In this incident, the condition was likely caused from direct ingestion of the toxin produced by the vegetative bacteria through contamination of the alfalfa hay cubes.

The FDA began their investigation, in conjunction

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with state departments, after reports that horses in Colorado, Louisiana, New Mexico, and Texas showed neurologic symptoms consistent with botulism. During LDAF's investigation, LDAF Investigators received information of possible alfalfa hay cube adulteration with animal remains. LDAF Investigators subsequently confirmed the presence of animal remains in an unopened 50 Ib. bag of "Top of the Rockies Alfalfa Horse Cubes" (Lot # 111422), produced

by Manzanola Feeds LLC, a feed manufacturing firm in Manzanola, CO. This finding indicated that material from an animal or animals may have been incorporated into the cubes during alfalfa harvesting. Clostridium botulinum, the bacterium that causes botulism, is commonly present in decaying animal carcasses.

As a result of this ongoing investigation, Manzanola Feeds has recalled Top of the Rockies alfalfa cubes with the date codes 111222, 111322, 111422, 111522,

NEW ORLEANS STYLE SHRIMP MOLD

Ingredients:

- 1 can tomato soup 2 8 ounce packs of cream cheese
- 2 pounds small shrimp, boiled and diced
- 1 cup low fat mayonnaise
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire
- 1 teaspoon hot sauce
- ¹/₂ cup green onion, diced
- 1 cup celery, finely diced
- 2 teaspoons red pepper
- 1 tablespoon FRUGE Cajun seasoning
- 2 tablespoons bourbon or cooking sherry
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- ³⁄₄ cup shrimp stock
- 2 packets of gelatin
- 2 tablespoons horseradish
- 1 box of crackers

If you boiled your own shrimp, save the stock to be used. If you purchased the shrimp already boiled, peel the shrimp and place the peelings and heads in a pot with 2 cups of water, add the bourbon/cooking sherry, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, and a few celery leaves. Cover and boil while you prepare the rest of the recipe.

Instructions:

On low heat, combine the tomato soup and cream cheese. Increase heat below medium and stir until the cream cheese melts, and then reduce heat back to low. Add mayonnaise, Worcestershire, hot sauce, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, and green onion. Stir well. Stir in celery, red pepper, FRUGE Cajun seasoning, and horseradish and cook for 5 minutes. Add diced shrimp to the pot. In a separate bowl, whisk gelatin and shrimp stock together then combine to the pot and stir well. Coat bunt pan, design mold, or large glass bowl with olive oil. Seeking Additional Knowledge, Experienced Producers Learn From Master Cattleman Course

For cousins Adam and Jonathan Knight, the cattle business is a part of their heritage.

Their family once ran a dairy farm on hundreds of acres that straddled East Baton Rouge and East Feliciana parishes, and they grew up around beef cattle. Now the Knights both run small cattle operations on those pastures and on leased land adjacent to them.

Even after a lifetime learning from friends and family, the Knights felt a need for more knowledge, so they enrolled in the LSU AgCenter Master Cattleman course and graduated this fall.

"For me, I am fortunate to be around a lot of older people who have cows and have had cows for a long time," Jonathan said. "One thing I've found is everybody will tell you how to do things their way, and none of it is ever the same."

The Master Cattleman courses added research-based lessons to the advice he had been given.

"The class is a little more centralized on basic knowledge," he said. "I got explanations on a lot of things that I was always told, 'This is what you should do.' You have the data to back it up.'"

Jonathan, а captain in the Zachary Fire Department, raises Hereford cattle to supply replacements and breeding stock for producers that want the Hereford blood lines. Adam, who manages maintenance for a Gulf Coast cemetery management company, raises SimAngus and black baldy cattle with his son and father, and he sells meat under his Cloverdale Farms label.

In Master Cattleman courses, Adam learned more about nutrition

and growing forages to efficiently feed his cattle.

"I just wanted to learn as much as I can," he said. "With the economy now and everything going up, all of us need as much knowledge as we can so we can best utilize our resources."

They both bale native grasses for hay and plant ryegrass with a mix of clover and vetch for winter forage.



"They said it in the class, and I had a friend of mine who recently passed away who said it, 'You can't have good cattle unless you have good food and forage, whether it be grasses or this and that.' That was the biggest thing I have learned, to produce the best product you possibly can," Jonathan said.

Both Adam and Jonathan raise cattle because they love raising animals and working their pastures. They both aim to make enough money to continue and maybe retire to tend to cattle full time.

"You don't do it for the money," Adam said. "You do it because you enjoy it."

Watered-Down Gasoline... Myths and Misconceptions

Have you ever heard of gas being watered down? If so, you can be assured it is only a myth. Many people speculate that gas stations water down their fuel so they can make more money, or that the fuel economy of your vehicle is diminished due to gas being diluted with water. Thankfully, neither of these is the case. The tolerance for water in any gasoline product at the point of retail sale is zero. That means if any water is found coming from the nozzle, the dispensers will be taken out of service.

The expression "like oil and water" can be used to explain why watered-down gasoline is a myth. Just like oil and water, gasoline and water do not combine on a molecular level, so any water in a fuel storage tank will settle and collect at the bottom. Even at the bottom of the tank, water typically would not be dispensed through the fuel dispenser system, and here's why.

Fuel dispensers are designed to draw fuel from six to eight inches above the bottom of the storage tank. Rules and regulations of the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Weights and Measures Division require that water levels in retail motor fuel storage tanks must be below two inches. This regulation, as well as the design of the system, helps protect the consumer from getting water instead of gasoline. If the tank's water level becomes too high, water could be pumped through the system, and that's when we catch problems.

It's important to note that the two-inch tolerance level mentioned above is for fuels that do not contain ethanol. Around 20 years ago, there was widespread introduction of ethanol to gasoline products. Along with this new blend of gasoline, new concerns arose pertaining to water in fuel. Molecu-

larly, water and ethanol can combine under the right conditions. That's why the tolerance level for water in tanks with gasoline/ethanol blends is much stricter, a mere 0.25 inches. These regulations help to reduce the risk of water being dispensed. Beyond that, fueling stations use

special filters that do not allow water to pass through them.

Remember, the tolerance for water in gasoline at the retail point of sale is zero. Also, locations that have underground fuel systems storage are required by The Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality to have regular tests performed to detect any leaks in the system. If leaks are detected, the location is required to have them fixed and then submit to retesting to verify that the problem has been addressed.

Before gasoline even gets to the pumps, producare required ers to perform quality testing to ensure that the fuel they produce meets all state and federrequirements. al Once the gas is available at retail locations. LDAF's

000001 Weights and Measures Division enforces regulations to ensure that the fuel meets the same requirements and ASTM standards used by producers. We do this through routine sampling and testing of retail fuel at our in-house laboratory in Baton Rouge. If any gasoline is found to not meet the requirements of the rules and regulations set forth by LDAF's Weights and Measures Division, that gasoline is red tagged, and sale of the product is stopped. To sell that product again, the location must complete needed work, including satisfactory sample testing.

Despite all these systems in place, water can occasionally be found in fuel that is dispensed at retail sale locations, but the possibility is slim, and it's almost always unintentional. The most common reason for water in gasoline stems from undetected issues with the underground storage tank or lines that lead from the tank to the dispensers.

Through regulation compliance, sampling, testing, and complaint investigations, LDAF Weights and Measures staff work day in and day out to ensure that you receive gasoline, not water, at retail fuel locations within the state of Louisiana.

However, if you think you have pumped contaminated fuel, we want to know about it. Starting this month, it'll be even easier for you to report a complaint, thanks to the new QR code that will be on all the seals we put on over 100,000 approved devices throughout Louisiana, including gas pumps. All you have to do is scan the QR code with your phone, and it will bring you to a fillable online complaint form. Or if you prefer, you can call our complaint line at 800-247-1086 to report the concern.

LSU Vet Med instrumental in identifying toxin affecting Louisiana horses

LSU Vet Med worked with the FDA and the Louisiana Department of Agriculture

The LSU School of Veterinary Medicine was instrumental in diagnosing and treating several horses in Louisiana infected with a suspected toxin. The investigation revealed a much wider problem, as the culprit was alfalfa cubes infected with Clostridium botulinum type C, which causes botulism. The cubes. which came from one source, were sold in several states, and horses in Louisiana, Texas, Colorado, and New Mexico became ill and many died as a result of the toxin.

Botulism is a rare but serious illness caused by toxins released by a bacteria that bind to nerves that affect muscled of the body and causes difficulty breathing, paralysis, and muscle even death. With Type C Botulism, the toxin is typically ingested from contaminated feeds and binds to nerve receptors; once this occurs, it cannot be reversed. If caught early, an anti-toxin can be used to keep free, unbound toxins from binding to the nerve receptors.

On December 3, 2022, a horse from a breeding farm in Vermilion Parish came to the LSU Veterinary

Teaching Hospital and was seen by and those horse owners attributed These horses presented initially the equine emergency service. A second horse arrived on December 4. Both horses presented with neurological issues and were tested for infectious agents, including Eastern Equine Encephalitis, West Nile virus, herpes virus, and rabies. On December 5, more horses from the same farm arrived with the same symptoms. Ultimately, LSU saw 15 horses, while others were treated at the farm with approximately 20 horses in Louisiana affected.

The first horses were initially treated by Mustajab Mirza, DVM, DACVS, associate professor of equine surgery. Rose Baker, BVMS, DACVIM(LAIM), assistant professor of equine medicine, took over the care of the horses and contacted Louisiana Department of the Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) with her suspicions that a toxin was the cause of the illness. Dr. Baker began working with Jonathan Roberts, DVM, director of the commercial feed program with LDAF, to determine the cause of the illness and its source. All of the affected horses in Louisiana came from the same breeding farm; however, it is possible that other horse in Louisana were affected

illness and/or death to another cause.

On December 6, Matthew Welborn, DVM (LSU 1987), MPH, DACVPM, professor of food animal health maintenance at LSU Vet Med, and Christine Navarre, DVM (LSU 1990), DACVIM, professor of veterinary science, traveled to the farm to look for possible toxins. At this point, the suspicion was that the horses had been exposed to a toxin on the property, such as from toxic plants or spoiled food. Drs. Welborn and Navarre did not find an obvious source of contamination at that point and suggested additional testing of the feed. A request was then made to the LDAF to perform a formal investigation of the feed and Dr. Roberts was contacted for his expertise.

Dr. Roberts worked with the farm and with LSU to coordinate testing of alfalfa cubes. Official samples were sent both to the FDA and the California Animal Health and Food Safety Laboratory at the University of California. Davis School of Veterinary Medicine, which returned a positive result for Clostridium botulinum type C. While UC Davis was testing the cubes, the Louisiana Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (LADDL) at LSU Vet Med, along with Dr. Baker, tested additional samples from patients for Botulism. LADDL also performed necropsies on 12 horses with additional toxin testing to further investigate the cause of death.

LSU Vet Med has successfully treated five horses and sent them home and is still treating two horses, one of which is about to foal.

cubes with these date codes, or you can't be sure of the date code of the products you have, throw them away in a secure container and follow the handling and cleaning instructions found at https:// www.fda.gov/animal-veterinary/ outbreaks-and-advisories/fdacautions-horse-owners-not-feedrecalled-lots-top-rockies-alfalfacubes-due-reports-illness-and.

Immediately consult a veterinarian if your horse ate this product and shows signs of neurologic illness, such as muscle tremors, difficulty eating or swallowing, difficulty standing, or collapse. You can also report the illness to FDA through the Safety Reporting Poron an emergency basis and were triaged. Due to the herd outbreak concerns, multiple diagnostic tests and intensive nursing care were required immediately. Taking care of these horses required roundthe-clock care, and a dedicated nursing staff in particular was critical in giving every one of these patients the best chance possible.

On December 17, 2022, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) issued a warning about recalled lots of alfalfa cubes that appear to have caused illness and death in horses; at that time, the FDA reported that horses in Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, and Colorado have shown neurological signs that may be related to this issue.If you believe that your horse has been affected, please contact vour veterinarian immediatelv or the LSU Veterinary Teaching Hospital at 225-578-9500.

On January 5, 2023, the LDAF sent out an advisory stating the cause of the illness and death was confirmed to be botulism. The auick resolution of this issue would not have been possible without the combined efforts of farm owners and staff, LSU Vet Med, LADDL, UC Davis, and the FDA.

both mentally and physically. Weather and climate changes, such as last year's heavy rains followed by drought conditions, not only influence crop choices each season but can wreak havoc on growth and harvesting concerns. It's a daily task to check for fungus or disease and make adjustments. Add to that the ever-rising costs of living, and you can imagine that managing a 40-acre farm in a sustainable way isn't easy, but the Cheniers rely on, and clearly appreciate, each other's strengths to keep this hard-working farm aoina

Betty likes to grow for different cultures and studies books to plan for new things to plant. In fact, she often takes requests from her customers who ask for a particular vegetable or variety. And the gratitude they show keeps her going and trying new things. "It makes me feel good," says Betty, "knowing I'm feeding their family quality, healthy food. They are thankful, and they know I care about them."

Recently retired from the natural gas industry, John humbly refers to himself as a "full-time dirt farmer." But Betty sees him as far more, saying he works like three 20-year-olds instead of one 68-year-old. John Boy, the Farmer, she calls him. Smiling and shaking her head, she adds, "I don't know how he works like that."

As one of 22 kids, John says his dad always inspired them to grow their own food, which was considered medicine in their home. Even as a kid, John tended a little garden, skipping play dates with neighborhood friends to check on it. "It didn't bother me," he says. "When you plant a tiny seed and see it grow into something that

you can taste and enjoy, it really gives you a sense of pride and joy."

That pride and joy are written all over his face when he talks about their farm and the connections they've made the community, in which include a longstanding presence at the Red Stick Farmers Market in Baton Rouge. where their smiles and fresh bounty have been a staple for more than

What is a food desert?

A food desert is an area with inadequate access to fresh, affordable foods needed to maintain a healthy diet, whether due to low-income levels or a lack of nearby options. Because people living in food deserts are at higher risk of diet-related conditions such as obesity, diabetes, and cardiovascular disease, government bodies and communities continue to develop programs and solutions aimed at preventing areas from becoming food deserts and improving people's access to food in existing ones.

Local farmers markets, popup stands, and cooperative programs (like Nourish Louisiana mentioned above) play a large role in making fresh fruits and vegetables available to all Louisiana citizens regardless of where they live.

25 years. There's a mutual respect between them and their customers, many of whom have become friends through the years.

More recently, Chenier Farms has participated in Nourish Louisiana, administered by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry. The program, made possible by the USDA's Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program (LFPA), purchases fresh produce, meats, seafood, and rice from local growers - focusing on those who come from historically mar-



ginalized populations or socially disadvantaged backgrounds. The food purchased is then provided to food banks in the state to be distributed throughout Louisiana's underserved communities where residents experience higher rates of food insecurity.

Through this program, Chenier Farms has established a great working relationship with Second Harvest Food Bank, which serves much of South Louisiana. Each season the food bank tells them what crops they want to distribute to local families in need. For example, they may lease a few rows of mustard and collard greens, cabbage, and green onions. The farm grows and harvests those crops, and the food bank picks them up and distributes them. It not only provides quality fresh fruit and vegetables to people in food deserts, but it also increases regular sales for the farm. "The collaboration has been wonderful," Betty says. " And it helps me sustain my farm."

Commissioner As Strain often says, you just can't beat fresh, local Louisiana specialty crops, especially when you can get them within a day of harvest, as John and Betty provide each week for the market. Indeed, the Cheniers say you can taste the difference in food that comes straight out of the ground, and they have passed that appreciation down in their own family and throughout their community.

"You know," says John. "It's a taste that you can't imagine how good it is until you try it. And it's a blessing to see our 16-yearold grandson enjoying that, too. The most important thing for us is what we put inside our bodies. Not what's outside, what's inside of us."

LDAF Commissioner Strain agrees, saying, "On my own farm, I like to go home, harvest something in the afternoon, and then have that for supper. It's just different when it's fresh. It tastes so much better. And it's more nutritious. The less processed the food. the healthier it is for you."

To get your hands on some fresh. delicious seasonal produce, head to your local farmer's market. And when you shop your favorite grocery stores or roadside stands, look for locally grown Louisiana specialty crops from your friendly neighborhood farmers like John and Betty Chenier.
